

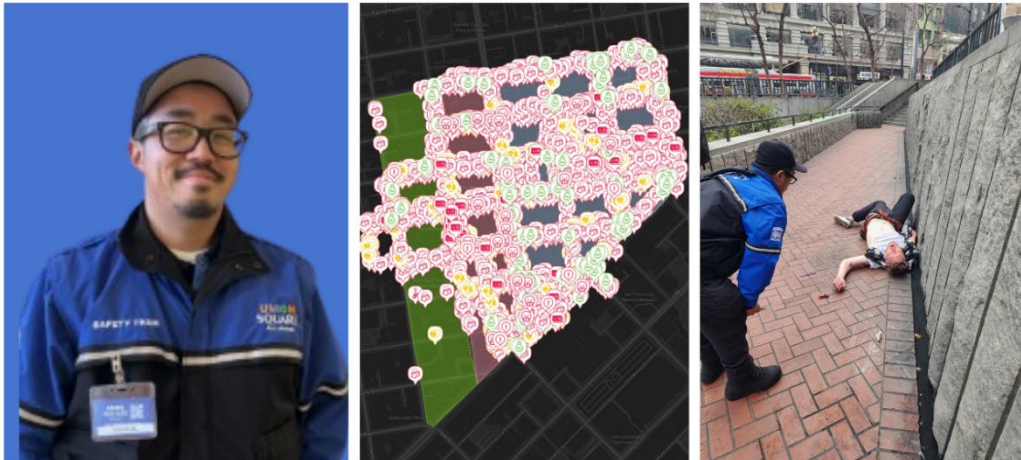

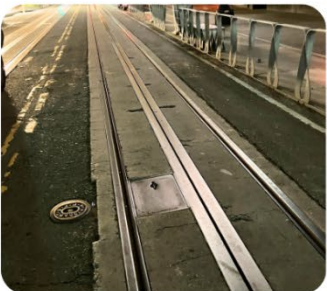
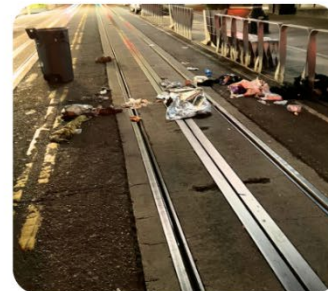

CLEANING STATISTICS

Consistency Across Core Services

November demonstrated continued stability across all core service categories. Sweep requests held steady at 5,857, nearly identical to October's total. This consistency reflects strong route adherence, reliable field presence, and disciplined follow-through from the Cleaning Team despite increased seasonal debris and visitor activity downtown.

Graffiti Abatement

Graffiti abatement saw a significant increase in November, rising to 541 tags removed, the highest count since August. This uptick reflects both increased tagging activity in the district and the team's heightened responsiveness. Rapid removal times continue to limit visual blight and maintain a welcoming environment for residents and visitors.

Hazardous Waste Clean-Up

Ambassadors completed 856 hazardous waste clean-ups in November, slightly above October's total. This sustained performance highlights the team's attentiveness to public health concerns and effective coordination between Cleaning and Safety Ambassadors to quickly address hazardous conditions.

Overflowing Trashcans and Seasonal Debris Volume

Overflowing trashcans decreased to 202 instances, down from October's spike related to Dreamforce. However, total litter and debris weight remained extremely high at 36,337 pounds, nearly matching last month's record-setting total. The increase is tied to heavy leaf fall, early holiday shopping crowds, and expanded street activation events across the district. The Cleaning Team maintained standards through targeted sweeps, additional mid-shift coverage, and continued pressure washing support.

Due to the addition of our Safety Ambassador Team, many of these stats are zero or significantly lower because the responsibilities have shifted from the cleaning team to the safety team.

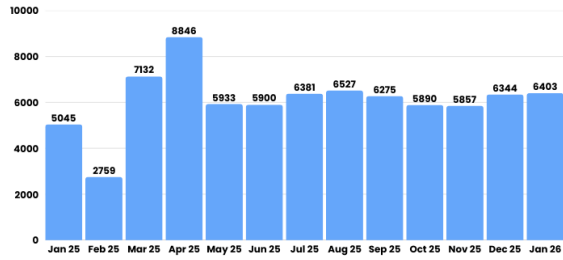

Union Square – Legion Security Monthly Report – January 2026

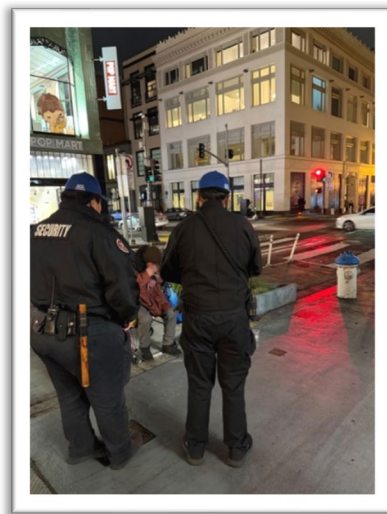
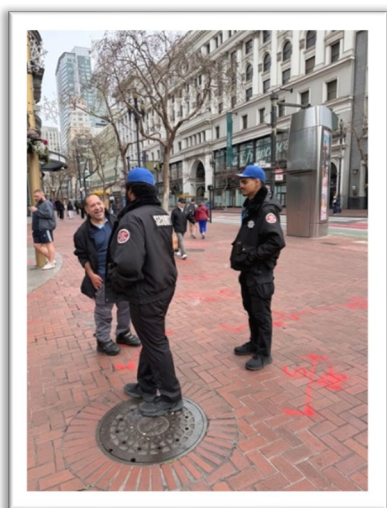
January marked a proactive and engagement-focused start to 2026 for the Union Square security team. Activity levels remained strong across enforcement, beautification coordination, and hospitality engagement, reinforcing consistent visibility and operational discipline throughout the district.

Officers responded to 698 dispatch calls and generated 989 self-initiated activities (SIA), reflecting a continued emphasis on proactive patrol strategy in high-traffic corridors including Powell, Post, Stockton, and Market Street.



Sit/lie ordinance enforcement remained a primary focus, with 1,011 documented contacts to maintain clear pedestrian pathways and storefront access. Quality-of-life enforcement also included 42 public intoxication cases, 48 narcotics-use contacts, and 35 mentally disturbed encounters, all handled using de-escalation tactics and proper documentation.

Notably, there were zero reported assaults, burglaries, thefts, or shoplifting incidents, underscoring the preventative impact of high-visibility patrol deployment

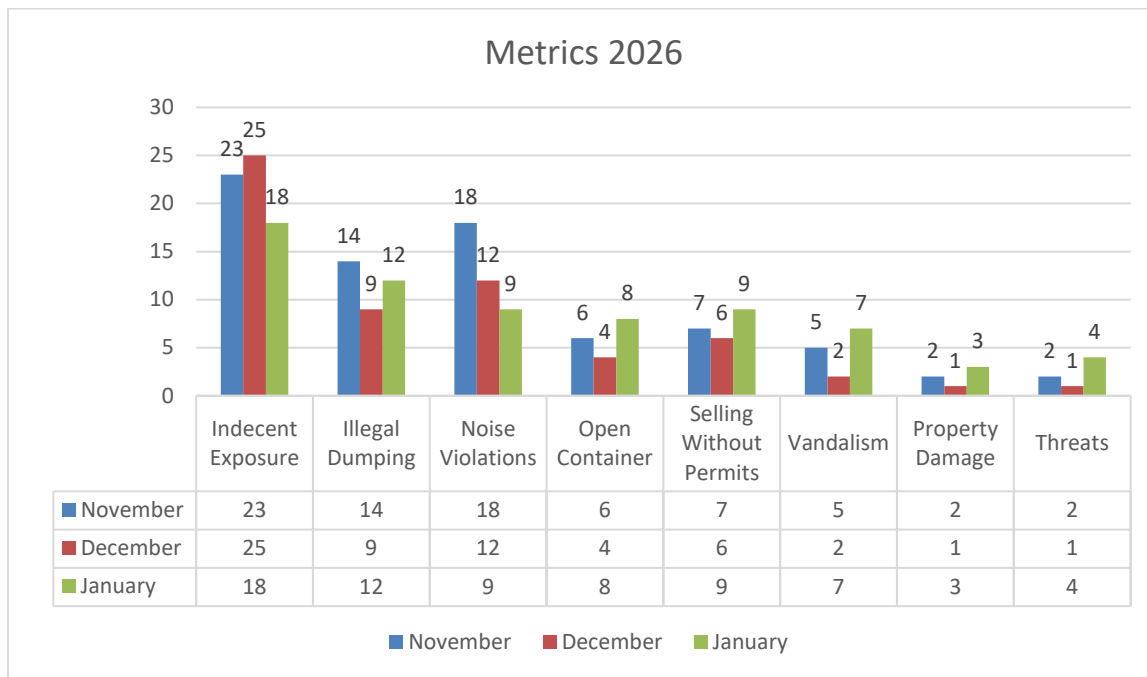

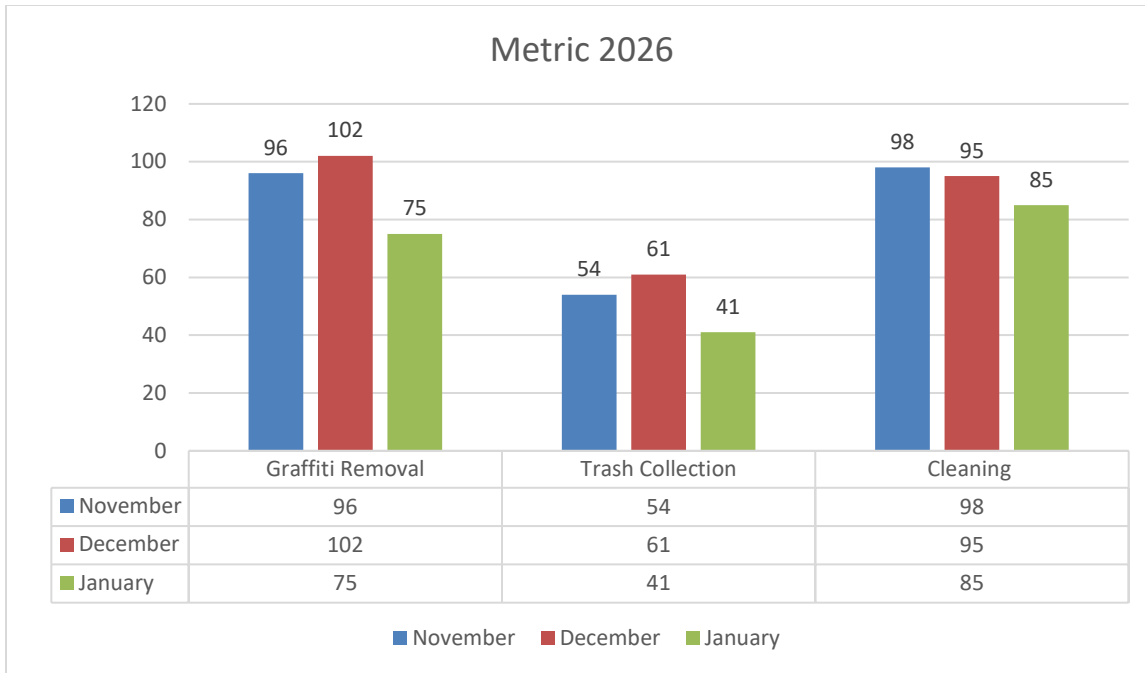
Additional activity included:

- 18 indecent exposure cases
- 12 illegal dumping incidents
- 9 noise violations
- 8 open container violations
- 9 selling without permit contacts
- 7 vandalism cases
- 3 property damage cases

In support of district presentation and beautification efforts, officers generated:

- 85 cleaning requests
- 75 graffiti removal requests
- 41 trash collection requests



Hospitality remained a core pillar of operations, with 498 documented hospitality encounters, assisting visitors, supporting businesses, and maintaining a welcoming presence throughout the district.

District Activation & Community Programming

January also featured continued activation through the Afternoons on Maiden Lane series, offering free public programming Thursdays through Sundays on the eastern block of Maiden Lane. Events included craft workshops, art activations, social gatherings, and live music, driving steady foot traffic and positive community engagement.

A standout activation was Latinas Forever (January 24) — a vibrant, all-ages celebration produced in partnership with the City of San Francisco, SPARK Social SF, and Union Square Alliance. The event featured music, performances, a Latina-owned pop-up market, and family-friendly programming that brought strong community energy into the heart of the district.

Legion maintained visible patrol presence during all activations, supporting pedestrian flow, storefront access, and overall safety without incident.

Operational Assessment

January reflects a steady and disciplined start to the year. High proactive activity, strong ordinance enforcement, robust safety/cleaning team coordination, and zero major violent or property crime incidents demonstrate continued operational effectiveness.

With consistent patrol visibility, strengthened coordination with SFPD and block by blocks safety team, and ongoing accountability standards, the team is positioned to build further momentum moving into February and making 2026, one of our most safe operational years yet.



Union Square - Notable Incident Summaries

Type of Incident: Fire / Property Damage

Incident Narrative:

On January 6, 2026, at approximately 19:40 hours, Officer Walid Amri discovered a trash container that had been partially burned on the public sidewalk adjacent to the 444 Stockton Street garage area within the Union Square district.

Upon inspection, the container displayed visible fire damage, including exterior charring and melting consistent with exposure to open flame. Burned debris was observed scattered around the immediate area. There were no active flames at the time of discovery.

No injuries were reported. However, the damaged container and surrounding debris presented a potential safety hazard to pedestrians and constituted damage to public property.

Actions Taken

- Officer assessed the scene for active fire or immediate threat.
- Area was monitored to ensure pedestrian safety and prevent further hazard.
- Appropriate authorities were notified to respond for removal of the damaged container and further investigation.
- Incident documented for record and follow-up.

Disposition

No suspects identified at time of report.

No injuries sustained.

Property damage confirmed.

Case referred to appropriate authorities for further investigation.

Incident Narrative:

On January 29, 2026, at approximately 15:15 hours, Officer Shrestha and Officer Singh responded to a dispatch call regarding a disruptive and intoxicated female subject in the area of 527–533 Sutter Street within the Union Square district.

Upon arrival, officers observed an adult white female wearing a pink face mask and black clothing. The subject was carrying a paper bag, a portable speaker, and a bottle of alcohol. She was initially located inside the 7-Eleven store at the above address.

Officers made contact with the subject as she exited the store. They asked if she required assistance and advised her to continue moving and leave the immediate area. The subject became verbally aggressive and made vulgar and racially inappropriate remarks toward responding officers.

Shortly thereafter, the subject entered the middle of the roadway, obstructing vehicle traffic, bicycle traffic, and cable car movement. Due to the immediate safety risk posed to herself and the public, officers requested Command Van assistance through dispatch.

San Francisco Police Department (Unit #177) arrived shortly thereafter. As SFPD officers approached, the subject moved aggressively toward Officer Singh. SFPD officers immediately intervened, gained control of the subject, and conducted further assessment. Legion officers and Union Square Safety Ambassadors provided statements and relevant information.

Based on observed behavior and officer statements, SFPD determined the subject appeared to be under the influence and posed a danger to herself and others. The subject was placed under arrest without further incident.

Actions Taken

- Officers assessed the subject and surrounding environment for immediate safety concerns.
- Verbal commands were issued directing the subject to vacate the area.
- Dispatch was contacted to request Command Van assistance.
- SFPD responded and assumed custody of the subject.
- Legion officers provided witness statements and documentation support.
- Scene was monitored until SFPD cleared the area.



Disposition

Subject arrested by San Francisco Police Department.

No injuries reported.

Custody transferred to SFPD without further incident.

Legion officers cleared the scene and resumed patrol operations.

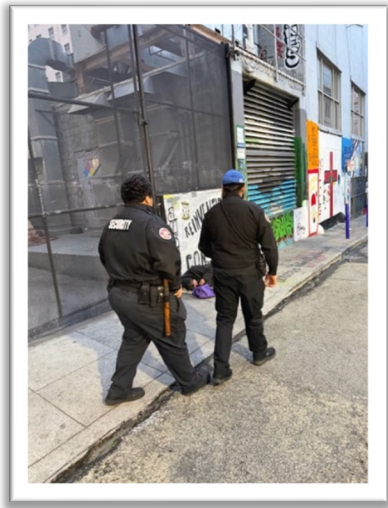

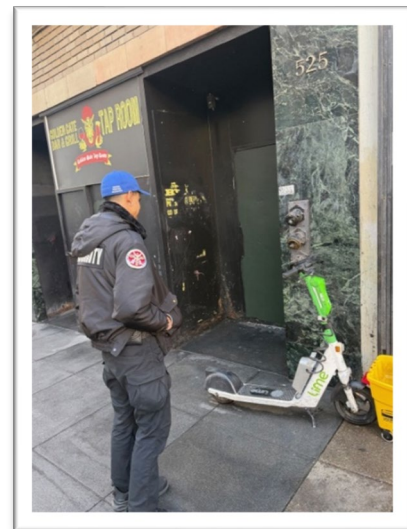
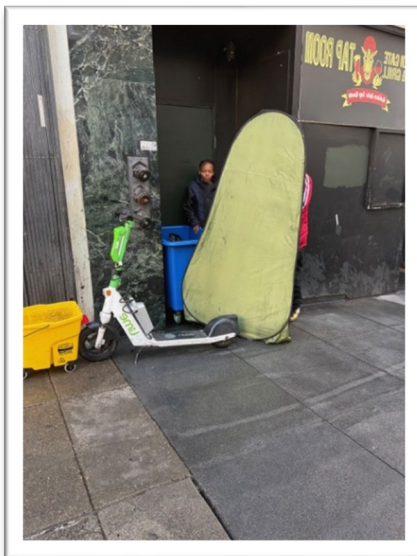
Legion Community Engagement and Safety Operations
